1 (Call to the order of the Court:)

2 COURTROOM DEPUTY: Calling Case Number 22-CR-20326,
3 United States of America versus Andre Lorquet.

4 Counsel, please state your appearances, beginning with
5 the Government.

6 MR. BAILYN: Good afternoon, Your Honor. Jonathan
7 Bailyn on behalf of the United States.

8 MR. BELL: Hello again, Judge. Henry Bell, on behalf
9 of the defendant, Mr. Lorquet.

10 THE COURT: Okay. Where are we?

11 MR. BELL: Judge, yesterday I moved the Court for a one
12 week extension of time to respond to the United States
13 objection to Judge Magistrate -- I'm sorry, Magistrate Judge
14 Louis' report and recommendation of the defendant's motion to
15 withdraw the plea.

16 The motion cites multiple reasons why, including my
17 ability to hear the recordings that they're relying on and, you
18 know, something I want to sort of generate -- not to undermine
19 my client's dignity in any way, but by spending several hours
20 with him, I realized he can't read or write, and that's made my
21 job a little bit more difficult.

22 THE COURT: So let me also kind of lay our cards on the
23 table to you. So, he pled guilty?

24 MR. BELL: Correct.

25 THE COURT: I haven't looked at the transcript yet, but

1 if I had to guess, it was under oath and the magistrate judge
2 asked all the standard questions that I would have asked,
3 including, Are you pleading guilty under your own free will
4 because you are, in fact, guilty?

5 And he probably said yes, under oath.

6 And then there was the motion to withdraw plea, and
7 also that he had problems with his counsel.

8 We've got very able counsel now on the case, and we've
9 got a report and recommendation from a Magistrate Judge who
10 recommends that the motion to withdraw the plea be granted, I
11 believe largely because the Government dropped the ball and
12 just didn't respond, and now they filed their objections.

13 So now you need more time, which is understandable, you
14 need to go over the evidence with your client, and my
15 inclination would be to re-refer the matter back to the
16 Magistrate Judge and give the Government a mulligan on your
17 failure to respond and let the Magistrate Judge have the
18 benefit of a merits-based opposition to the motion and then see
19 what the magistrate judge does, and then get an R&R from the
20 magistrate judge and go from there.

21 Do you have any problem with that?

22 MR. BELL: Well, Judge, I would agree that the Court
23 has the discretion to make that ruling, if you will, referral,
24 and I would certainly abide by it as expeditiously as I could
25 to do the magistrate scheduling order.

1 THE COURT: Okay.

2 MR. BELL: Without sort of getting ahead of my skis
3 and -- because I do feel like I have some work to do. He is a
4 new client who I am building trust with -- or trying to.

5 But although at this point we would probably continue
6 to, based on my last meeting with my client, continue to
7 maintain that he wants to withdraw his plea, but I may do
8 things a little bit differently than his prior counsel did, and
9 I would like that opportunity; and if you refer to Magistrate
10 Judge Louis, that's what I'll do.

11 THE COURT: Well, I guess there's a question mark that
12 I have about the timing of doing that and whether I should hold
13 off doing that until you've had an opportunity to go over the
14 evidence in more thorough detail and revisit the issue of the
15 motion to withdraw of your client.

16 And if he still wants to persist in that, that's fine.

17 What I can tell you, at least in past practices where
18 I've reviewed the transcripts of, and the defendant is under
19 oath and all the questions are asked, you check all those boxes
20 and a finding was made that it's very hard to disturb that plea
21 that was knowing and voluntarily entered, at least so stated
22 under oath by the defendant.

23 MR. BELL: I understand, Judge, and I appreciate your
24 perspective on that. And I mean, to the extent that I may have
25 something different to say or to re-position, if you will,

1 things in some way than prior counsel, I can attempt to do that
2 in response to the Government's objection or to Judge Louis, if
3 that's what you decide to do now.

4 I mean, I'll defer to the Court on the procedure, and
5 but I do -- I do -- in either case, I do need to receive those
6 recordings, I need to review them with him and I need to deal
7 with the facts -- again, I don't want to get too far ahead of
8 my skis but to sort of give you the benefit of my thinking and
9 where I am at this point, to deal with the fact of how exactly,
10 if at all, does the fact that he can't really read or write,
11 and I now have to read things to him play into the assertion --
12 the very specific assertions made in the motion to withdraw.

13 THE COURT: Well, he doesn't need to read or write to
14 say -- the defendant's back there, I don't know if you wanted
15 him or not here.

16 MR. BELL: I thought he might be here, but then I
17 thought he wasn't when you called the case without him, but we
18 can have him here, it makes sense to bring him in here.

19 THE COURT: All right.

20 (Brief pause in the proceedings awaiting defendant's
21 appearance.)

22 THE COURT: I guess he was here. They may have
23 concluded and took all the inmates back down.

24 MR. BELL: Right, I understand, and I'll certainly
25 explain everything to him after when I see him again.

1 THE COURT: Yes.

2 MR. BELL: I understand where you're going, Judge, but
3 again, I, at this point, I'd rather -- I don't want to get into
4 at this point client confidences that may come out but not now.

5 THE COURT: I certainly don't want you to. I'm just
6 trying to think, would it be more efficient to --

7 MR. BELL: Sure.

8 THE COURT: -- before we re-refer the matter get a --
9 was there a response to the objection?

10 MR. BELL: So the United States objected, I think on
11 Thursday or Friday of last week, and I have yet to file any
12 sort of response.

13 The motion I filed last night was my seeking from
14 Your Honor an extension of time to file that response, because
15 I will be out of town part of the period kind of which I -- I
16 asked Louis' one week, the period of time I would normally have
17 a response.

18 THE COURT: Let me do this. Let me have you respond by
19 July 28th.

20 MR. BELL: Okay, that's fair.

21 THE COURT: It gives you a month.

22 MR. BELL: That's fair.

23 THE COURT: And that way you get a chance to spend
24 whatever time you need, not doing something on this case or
25 somewhere else. It will also give you time to formulate a

1 response, to meet with the client, and then when you do
2 respond, I would appreciate it if you could include in there
3 that you -- that the defendant wishes to persist in withdrawal
4 of his change of plea.

5 MR. BELL: Right.

6 THE COURT: And if that changes, then you'll let me
7 know that as well.

8 MR. BELL: Absolutely. Obviously, if it changes, I
9 would be the first one to let the Court know so we can go onto
10 the next phase. If it is the case that we continue on his
11 behalf to assert that, I would say -- he wants to change his --
12 withdraw his plea, I'm sorry.

13 THE COURT: Is he out there?

14 COURTROOM DEPUTY: Marshall, do you know if --

15 THE COURT: Is he in the lockup right there?

16 THE MARSHAL: They got him back there, yes.

17 THE COURT: Okay, bring him out.

18 (The defendant entered the courtroom with the Marshal.)

19 MR. BELL: I'm sorry, Judge, I am e-mailing
20 Judge Altonaga's court because I have to go there once I'm done
21 here.

22 THE COURT: What time is that hearing? I think we're
23 okay. We'll try to get you out of here.

24 MR. BELL: I don't have a lot more to add, but if he's
25 here, he might as well see that we were all talking about this.

1 THE COURT: Okay.

2 MR. BELL: And I can quickly tell him what I've
3 requested and your suggestion that you will give me until the
4 28th to respond.

5 THE COURT: Okay.

6 (Brief pause in the proceedings.)

7 THE COURT: Mr. Lorquet is present. Do you need a
8 moment to speak with your --

9 MR. BELL: May I, Your Honor?

10 THE COURT: All right.

11 (Discussion held off the record between counsel and
12 defendant.)

13 MR. BELL: Thank you, Judge, I appreciate that.

14 I've had the opportunity to speak to Mr. Lorquet to
15 bring him up-to-speed, and if it's still the case that you're
16 willing to set a deadline of the 28th to respond to the
17 objection, that's what I'll accept --

18 THE COURT: Okay.

19 MR. BELL: --- and agree to, Your Honor.

20 And as you stated, we'll make our position clear,
21 obviously, in that application, or response, if you will, and
22 then based on that you can -- we'll see where we are, and it
23 may be that you send it back Judge Louis, which I also
24 explained to Mr. Lorquet.

25 THE COURT: Okay. Do you waive speedy trial?

1 MR. BELL: Yes. Yes, Your Honor, we do waive speedy
2 trial.

3 THE COURT: All right. Okay, we'll do that. All
4 right. Anything from the Government?

5 MR. BAILYN: Your Honor, I just wanted to note,
6 Mr. Bell provided us a hard drive, we put all the discovery on
7 it, and I got a notification from Fed Ex that it arrived at his
8 office today. I wanted to make sure that all the discovery got
9 over to defense counsel.

10 THE COURT: Okay.

11 MR. BELL: Yeah. For the record, you would think I got
12 some of this from prior counsel. I did, she sent me a bunch of
13 discovery. Some of it was too voluminous, if you will, to
14 transfer through the link she provided me.

15 And apparently, there's a lot there. Mr. Bailyn's
16 indexes -- according to my assistant -- were 246 pages long.
17 But I'll be focused more -- at this point, more on the issues
18 that we just discussed from the recordings of the jail calls,
19 et cetera.

20 THE COURT: Thank you.

21 MR. BELL: Thank you, Judge.
