DEFENDANT'S SENTENCING MEMORANDUM

I. INTRODUCTION

Before this Court stands Christnel Orisca, a 26-year-old first-generation Haitian-American, a naturalized United States citizen, a former corrections officer, a devoted son and uncle, and a young man who made a serious and costly mistake that he has spent the past several years confronting with honesty, humility, and uncommon resolve. Mr. Orisca respectfully submits this Sentencing Memorandum in connection with his sentencing and respectfully requests that the Court impose a sentence of nine (9) months of home confinement, followed by a period of supervised release, with restitution and forfeiture as set forth in the plea agreement.

The plea agreement in this case reflects an offense level of 9 and a Criminal History Category of I, yielding a Guideline Sentencing Range of four to ten months. The PSR confirms no criminal history whatsoever and notes that the zero-point offender reduction under USSG §4C1.1 applies. The applicable guideline range falls within Zone B of the Sentencing Table, a range that, by design, may be satisfied without any period of incarceration. A sentence of home confinement within the Zone B range, with supervised release, is not a departure; it is a guideline-contemplated and factually warranted resolution that serves each of the purposes enumerated in 18 U.S.C. § 3553(a).

The government's memorandum recommends four months at the low end of the range. Defense counsel respectfully urges this Court to impose a sentence of nine months of home confinement, a sentence that is more demanding in structure and duration than the government's request, but which preserves Mr. Orisca's ability to remain in the community, continue his documented rehabilitation, fulfill his restitution obligation, and serve as the father figure and anchor that his 11-year-old nephew, whose own father is absent, desperately needs.

The record before this Court is extraordinary. Mr. Orisca's post-offense conduct is not a courtroom performance. It is a verified, documented chronicle of a young man who, upon being confronted with the gravity of his conduct, did not wait to be told what to do. He enrolled in professional courses. He logged over sixty hours volunteering with critically ill patients. He secured legitimate employment. He registered for a law enforcement examination. He shows up, as he always has, for the people who need him.

This memorandum presents the full picture of Christnel Orisca: the offense, its context, and equally, the man behind it.

II. FACTUAL AND PERSONAL BACKGROUND

A. The Journey to America

Christnel Orisca was born on October 2, 1999, in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. When he was twelve years old, his parents emigrated to the United States, leaving him behind in Haiti with his older siblings. His parents covered the family's living expenses from abroad, and the children attended school daily. On October 25, 2014, when Christnel was only fifteen years old, he and his brothers were finally reunited with their parents in Massachusetts. He arrived in America knowing almost no English, navigating a new language, a new culture, and a new educational system during high school. He enrolled at Community Academy of Science and Health in Dorchester, where he learned English and, in June 2017, earned his high school diploma. He subsequently attended Bunker Hill Community College, where he studied Criminal Justice, Psychology, and Forensic Science, the curriculum of a young man who, even then, was orienting himself toward a life of public service.

On January 15, 2020, Christnel Orisca became a naturalized United States Citizen. His entire adult life, from the moment he arrived in this country, has been defined by work. From Securitas security at TD Garden to campus security at Pine Manor College to FedEx delivery to the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, Christnel has always been employed, always working, always contributing, always striving.

B. The Offense

The offense conduct is not disputed and Mr. Orisca has fully accepted responsibility for it. Between May 2020 and September 2021, Mr. Orisca fraudulently claimed Pandemic Unemployment Assistance and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation while employed, collecting approximately \$34,700 in pandemic unemployment benefits to which he was not entitled. In March 2021, at a time when he was approximately 21 years old, he participated in a Paycheck Protection Program loan scheme, submitting false documentation to obtain \$20,000 in PPP funds that he subsequently misused, obtaining a loan forgiveness to which he was not entitled. The total fraud proceeds are \$54,700. Mr. Orisca has admitted this conduct and pled guilty pursuant to a written plea agreement. He does not minimize what he did. What this memorandum asks the Court to consider, alongside the offense, is the full human being before it – the context in which these decisions were made, the person who made them, and the man who has emerged on the other side.

C. Context the Court Should Weigh

Mr. Orisca was 20 to 21 years old during the period of the offense, newly naturalized, newly arrived in the workforce, and, as the government itself acknowledges, subjected in no small measure to the influence and apparent direction of an older family member in the PPP fraud. The government's own sentencing memorandum notes that "the PPP loan fraud was accomplished in

no small part with Mr. Orisca's older brother's apparent influence and direction," and that another family member participated in the same scheme. Mr. Orisca was the youngest and least experienced of the participants. He has been the only one charged.

This is not offered as an excuse. Christnel Orisca is an adult, and he made adult choices. But the Court's obligation under § 3553(a)(1) is to consider "the history and characteristics of the defendant," and those characteristics include the youth, the immigrant experience, the family pressure, and the absence of criminal sophistication that marked this period of his life. The government itself was moved by these facts, acknowledging in its own filing that Mr. Orisca "remains an unusual candidate among these convicted fraudsters."

Since being confronted by the federal justice system, Mr. Orisca has done everything right. He has admitted his conduct. He has cooperated. He has complied fully with every pretrial condition. He has worked, served, studied, and shown up, whether for his community, for his family, and for the people who depend on him. The PSR confirms: *"Probation and Pretrial Services' records indicate that the defendant has complied with all Court-ordered conditions of release."* PSR ¶ 5.

III. SENTENCING GUIDELINES ANALYSIS

The parties and the Probation Office are in agreement on the guideline calculation:

Total Offense Level 9 and Criminal History Category I yield a Guideline Sentencing Range of 4 to 10 months' imprisonment. PSR ¶ 91. The range falls in Zone B of the Sentencing Table. Critically, the PSR confirms that because Mr. Orisca "received an adjustment under USSG §4C1.1 (Adjustment for Certain Zero-Point Offenders) and the defendant's applicable guideline range is in Zone A or B of the Sentencing Table," a sentence other than imprisonment is "generally appropriate." PSR ¶ 92 (citing USSG §5C1.1, comment. n.10).

Zone B expressly permits the minimum term to be satisfied by a term of probation that includes a condition of home detention. USSG §5C1.1(c)(3). A sentence of nine months of home confinement is within the guideline range as contemplated by the Sentencing Commission and is consistent

with the applicable policy statement. It is not a departure. It is the Guidelines working as designed, providing flexibility for exactly the kind of defendant who stands before this Court.

JSIN data for defendants in this cell (Total Offense Level 9, CHC I, §2B1.1) further supports a non-custodial outcome. Of 274 similarly situated defendants in the five-year period, 49% received probation or fine only, and the median sentence imposed across all 274 defendants was zero months. PSR ¶ 108. The average length of imprisonment among those who did receive a custodial sentence was just three months, and the median was one month. The statistical weight of outcomes in this cell points toward a non-custodial or minimal-custody resolution. A nine-month home confinement sentence is measured, proportionate, and consistent with national practice.

IV. THE 18 U.S.C. § 3553(A) FACTORS

A. Nature and Circumstances of the Offense

The offense involved pandemic fraud (wire fraud and a false statement to a financial institution) arising from the extraordinary and unprecedented disruptions of COVID-19. Mr. Orisca's total fraud proceeds of \$54,700 arose over approximately 16 months, during a period when, as the government itself acknowledges, COVID-19 fraud was "a drop in the proverbial bucket" in a national fraud landscape estimated at \$100 to \$135 billion. This observation is not meant to minimize Mr. Orisca's personal culpability; it is offered to calibrate proportionality. The offense did not involve violence, sophisticated money laundering, or exploitation of vulnerable individuals.

There was no obstruction of justice. PSR ¶ 36. There were no victims in the traditional sense: the SBA and Massachusetts DUA were institutional victims, and the loss amounts (\$20,000 and \$34,700 respectively) will be fully addressed through restitution. Mr. Orisca has agreed to the \$54,700 forfeiture money judgment and is committed to satisfying his restitution obligation. The nature of this offense committed by a young man in his early twenties under family influence and amid pandemic-era chaos is meaningfully different from the calculated, long-running schemes that warrant custodial sentences. The circumstances of the offense call for a firm, but measured, response.

B. History and Characteristics of the Defendant

Christnel Orisca's history is one of consistent work, family devotion, and a genuine aspiration toward public service. He has worked continuously since arriving in America at age fifteen. He earned his high school diploma. He studied criminal justice. He completed a rigorous, 320-hour state-accredited corrections training program. He was promoted to a specialized transportation role in the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, a position that normally takes eight to ten years to earn, *within his first years on the job*.

He has zero criminal history. The single prior contact noted in the PSR, a 2022 property damage charge that was dismissed, involved no conviction and no relevance to this proceeding. PSR ¶ 56. He has no history of violence, no substance abuse history, no gang affiliation, no mental health

history. He is, by every objective measure, a person of unusual institutional reliability and human decency.

The numerous community letters before this Court span the full arc of Christnel's life and relationships.¹ They come from a 25-year corrections veteran, a 12-year high school counselor, an immigration law clerk, a coworker of five years, a partner, lifelong friends, and perhaps most powerfully, his own family. These are not form letters. They are specific, personal, and consistent in their conclusion: Christnel Orisca is a good person who made a serious mistake, and his goodness has not been undone by it.

His sister Nirva, who sacrificed enormously to reunite her family in the United States after the 2010 Haitian earthquake, describes her brother as *"one of the most remarkable human beings I know."* His brother Wilgens recounts an eleven-year-old Christnel in the aftermath of the earthquake, choosing to share food and supplies with neighboring children who had nothing. His nephew Noah, whose father chose to be absent from his life, wrote to this Court in his own words: *"My uncle Christnel is very important to me. He is like a father to me."*

Captain Shaunette Fitzpatrick, a 25-year veteran of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department, describes Christnel's rapid advancement as a corrections officer, observing that he *"excelled in every position he worked."* Chase Grogan, a counselor who has known Christnel for twelve years, writes that he *"often brings life to any room he is in"* and describes a man who volunteers not for recognition, but out of genuine care for others.

C. The Need for the Sentence Imposed

Under § 3553(a)(2), the Court must consider deterrence, public protection, and rehabilitation. Each of these purposes is fully served, and in some respects better served, by a nine-month home confinement sentence than by a period of incarceration.

Specific Deterrence. The federal conviction alone, a permanent record that has already cost Mr. Orisca his career as a corrections officer, constitutes an extraordinary deterrent for this specific defendant. His professional aspirations were anchored in law enforcement; that door is now effectively closed. The loss of his career, the stigma of federal conviction, the two-plus years of pretrial supervision, and the full weight of this proceeding have produced a man who is not at risk of re-offense. As the government's own memorandum acknowledges: "The defendant's admission of his conduct has already resulted in the loss of his job and the premature termination of his budding career in law enforcement."

General Deterrence. A federal felony conviction carries substantial general deterrent effect regardless of custodial component. The permanence of a federal record, the public nature of this proceeding, and the restitution obligation all signal unmistakably that pandemic fraud carries lasting consequences. A non-custodial sentence does not send a message of leniency; it reflects the proportionate application of law to a first offender with no prior record, full acceptance of responsibility, and extraordinary post-offense conduct.

Protection of the Public. There is no evidence that Christnel Orisca poses any risk to the community. His compliance with all pretrial conditions over more than a year has been perfect. PSR ¶ 5. He is employed, enrolled in vocational training, and engaged in structured community service. Home confinement and supervised release provide ample monitoring to protect the public, while allowing Mr. Orisca to continue the constructive trajectory he has established.

Rehabilitation. This is, perhaps, the most powerful factor before the Court because Mr. Orisca's rehabilitation is not pending. It has already occurred. In documented, verified, timestamped actions, he has rebuilt his life. Section V of this memorandum addresses his post-offense conduct in detail.

D. Avoiding Unwarranted Sentencing Disparities

Section 3553(a)(6) directs the Court to avoid unwarranted disparities among defendants with similar records and similar conduct. JSIN data reveals that among 274 similarly situated defendants (same offense level, same criminal history category), 49% received no incarceration whatsoever. The median sentence imposed across that cohort was zero months. For those who did receive imprisonment, the average was three months. A nine-month home confinement sentence, while somewhat more structured than the statistical median, is well within the range of outcomes that courts have imposed for defendants in precisely this posture.

V. POST-OFFENSE REHABILITATION: A DOCUMENTED RECORD OF TRANSFORMATION

Federal courts are rightly skeptical of last-minute rehabilitation. This case is different. The record before the Court reflects not performance, but accomplishment: a chronology of actions taken, certificates earned, hours logged, and commitments maintained before any sentencing pressure required them.²

A. Community Service: 63.11 Hours with the Critically Ill

Since September 25, 2025, Mr. Orisca has volunteered consistently with Community Servings, a Boston nonprofit that provides medically tailored, home-delivered meals to individuals and families living with critical and chronic illnesses, including cancer and HIV/AIDS. He has logged 63.11 hours of documented service, verified in writing by T'sera Mirescu, Manager of Volunteer Services, on January 29, 2026.

The shift log attached to Ms. Mirescu's verification letter tells the most compelling story. Mr. Orisca reported for service on consecutive days (October 16 and 17, October 23 and 24, October 30 and 31, November 6 and 7), week after week, without interruption, through the fall and into January 2026. He showed up more than twenty-five times across four months, for people he had never met, asking nothing in return. He did not taper off. He did not reduce his commitment as the novelty wore off. His counselor Chase Grogan, who has known him for twelve years, independently confirmed this service to the Court, noting that it is done *"not for recognition, but out of a sincere desire to help those in need."*

B. Education: A 60-Hour Medical Interpreting Certificate

In October 2025, while simultaneously volunteering at Community Servings, Mr. Orisca enrolled in and completed a 60-hour Medical Interpreting Certificate course at Massasoit Community College's Brockton campus. The course ran on Saturdays from 9:00 AM to 3:30 PM, and Mr. Orisca completed it on December 13, 2025. The certificate was awarded by Massasoit's Academic Affairs Division and bears the signatures of the Associate Vice President of Academic Affairs and the Associate Dean of Community Education.

This credential is meaningful on multiple levels. First, it represents sixty hours of rigorous, in-person professional instruction. Second, it is linguistically anchored: Mr. Orisca is a native Haitian Creole speaker, fluent in French, and proficient in English, making him a *trilingual medical interpreter* capable of serving Boston's chronically underserved Haitian community. Third, it reflects a deliberate turn toward a career of service and healing: on January 12, 2026, he began working as a Haitian Creole interpreter through Baystate Interpreters, serving schools and hospitals at \$26 per hour. PSR ¶ 78.

As Birica-Bikira Noel, J.D., observed in her letter to this Court, this course demonstrated *"a deliberate commitment to education, accountability, and meaningful work that benefits others."* A

young man who enrolls in a rigorous professional certification program while on pretrial release is not performing remorse, rather, he is building something real.

C. Employment: A Return to Public Service

Mr. Orisca is now gainfully employed consistent with his lifelong pattern of working. His interpreting role at Baystate Interpreters places him in hospitals and schools, serving vulnerable patients and students who need language access to receive care and education. This is the career trajectory of a man whose instinct, even now, is to orient himself toward service.

In early 2026, Mr. Orisca applied to the JATC of Greater Boston Telecomm Apprenticeship Program, a competitive, structured apprenticeship offering skilled trade certification, union wages, and long-term economic stability. He has also been cleared to schedule the Massachusetts Trial Court Officer Examination (REACH) for Spring 2026, administered by IOS Recruitment in coordination with Pearson VUE on behalf of the Massachusetts Trial Court. That registration speaks volumes: even now, Christnel Orisca's instinct is to reach toward public service and lawful responsibility.

D. The Rehabilitation Is Real

Each item in this record is documented and verified. This is not a list of intentions. These are completions. Christnel Orisca did not wait to be ordered into service: he chose it, sustained it, and built upon it across months and into a new year. The rehabilitation is real, and it was underway long before today. *"His rehabilitation has not been abstract or aspirational; it has been reflected in consistent, everyday actions that show accountability, structure, and care for others,"* said Birica-Bikira Noel in her support letter.

VI. THE VOICE OF CHRISTNEL ORISCA'S COMMUNITY

Ten individuals have come forward to speak on behalf of Christnel Orisca. They were not asked to perform loyalty. They came because they know him across years, across settings, across the hardships of his life. Each represents an independent voice. Together, they speak as one. Captain Shaunette Fitzpatrick of the Suffolk County Sheriff's Department observed Mr. Orisca under the exacting conditions of correctional work: the pressure, the scrutiny, the daily demands of a uniformed law enforcement role. She describes *"passion, determination and leadership"* that led supervisors to fast-track him into a specialized transportation unit, a promotion that normally takes eight to ten years. *"He has always excelled in every position he worked."*

Chase Grogan, a counselor who has known Mr. Orisca for twelve years, describes a man whose *"commitment to serving others"* is genuine and quiet, not performed, not announced. He is currently involved in weekly food delivery to elderly community members. *"This is not something he does loudly or for recognition, but rather out of a sincere desire to help those in need."*

Birica-Bikira Noel provides a precisely observed clinical account of Mr. Orisca's rehabilitation classes completed, service performed, structure maintained and concludes: *"What ultimately*

defines a person is not the mistake itself, but how they respond afterward." By that measure, Christnel Orisca has answered.

His sister Nirva gave up her own opportunities to bring her family to America. She writes of her brother's loss, not only of his career, but of the freedom to travel and to dream. She asks for mercy, not perfunctory acknowledgment. His brother Wilgens witnessed an eleven-year-old Christnel choose generosity in the rubble of an earthquake: *"This was the moment I knew Christnel would grow up to be a man with a huge heart for others."*

And then there is Noah, eleven years old, whose father chose to be absent, and whose uncle chose to show up. In his own words: *"My uncle Christnel is very important to me. He is like a father to me. He is always there when I need him. He helps me with school, talks to me when I am sad, and makes sure I feel safe."* Noah writes plainly: *"I know he is a good person."* This Court is asked to weigh what the removal of that presence would mean, not in abstract terms, but in the life of a child already navigating paternal absence.

VII. THE REQUESTED SENTENCE

For the foregoing reasons, Mr. Orisca respectfully requests that the Court impose the following sentence:

1. Nine (9) months of home confinement, to be served as a condition of supervised release, satisfying the Zone B minimum term under USSG §5C1.1(c)(3);
2. A term of supervised release as determined by the Court, with standard conditions and such special conditions as the Court may deem appropriate, including financial disclosure and repayment monitoring;
3. Restitution in the amount of \$54,700 (\$20,000 to the Small Business Administration; \$34,700 to the Massachusetts Department of Unemployment Assistance), to be paid according to a court-ordered repayment schedule;
4. Forfeiture in the amount of \$54,700, as set forth in the plea agreement;
5. A special assessment of \$600 (\$100 per count); and,
6. No fine, given the defendant's current financial circumstances and substantial restitution obligation. PSR ¶ 89.

This sentence is within the guideline range, consistent with the applicable policy statement for Zone B zero-point offenders, proportionate to the offense, and fully supported by the § 3553(a) factors. It is more demanding than the government's four-month request in terms of both duration and structure; respectfully, nine months of home confinement is not a lenient outcome. It is firm, measured, and appropriate. Most importantly, it is a sentence that does not require this Court to remove from the community a young man who has demonstrated, by everything he has done since

this case began, that the community is where he belongs, and that he will not waste a second chance.

VIII. CONCLUSION

Christnel Orisca arrived in America at fifteen without English, without resources, and without a road map. He built one, through work, through study, through service, through showing up for the people who needed him. He violated the law in the chaos of a pandemic, as an influenced young man, and he has paid for it in ways that extend far beyond any formal sanction: a career ended, a dream foreclosed, a federal record that will follow him always.

What he has not done is stop. He has not retreated. He has not asked for sympathy without earning it. He has shown, through 63 hours of meals delivered to the critically ill, through a 60-hour medical interpreting certificate earned on Saturdays, through steady employment and community commitment, that he understands what accountability looks like, not as a concept, but as a practice.

The Guidelines envision exactly this outcome for exactly this kind of defendant: a Zone B sentence, served in the community, with supervision and structure, for a first offender whose zero-point record and extraordinary personal history counsel against incarceration. The Court is beseeched to honor that vision. Nine months of home confinement is a significant restriction on liberty. It carries supervision, monitoring, and consequence. What it does not do is remove from Noah the uncle who is also his father. What it does not do is interrupt the volunteer work, the interpreting career, the forward momentum that Mr. Orisca has built, work that does not benefit him alone, but benefits the patients, students, and elderly neighbors he serves.

Christnel Orisca is a good man. He has earned the right to continue proving that to this Court.

My name is Wilgens Orisca and I am writing you on behalf of my younger brother Christnel Orisca. I have grown up with Christnel my whole life in the same house. My name is Nirva Orisca and Christnel Orisca is my youngest brother. He is one of the most remarkable human beings I know—not simply because he is my brother, but because of who he is at his core.

I migrated to the United States in 1997 at the age of 12. Two years later, Christnel was born in Haiti. I remember counting down the days until I could return home to finally meet him. From that moment on, we formed a bond that has never broken. As the oldest sibling and him the youngest, I have always viewed Christnel as my own child. That sense of responsibility shaped me early in life.

Even at a young age, I worked tirelessly because my goal was always bigger than myself. I wanted to provide my brothers with the same opportunities I was blessed with. I dreamed of all of us being together in the United States—working hard, building lives, and making names for ourselves. After the devastating earthquake in Haiti, I petitioned for my father and stepmother, and as a result, my three brothers were able to migrate shortly after. Reuniting my family remains one of my proudest accomplishments as a big sister. I kept my promise.

Christnel and I have remained especially close. He has always looked up to me—whether he admits it or not. Even his love for LeBron James came from me (and yes, I remind him often). We share the same drive: a deep love for hard work and travel. We are the first to pick up overtime and the first to book a flight. We had dreams of traveling the world together.

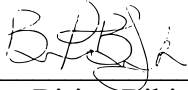

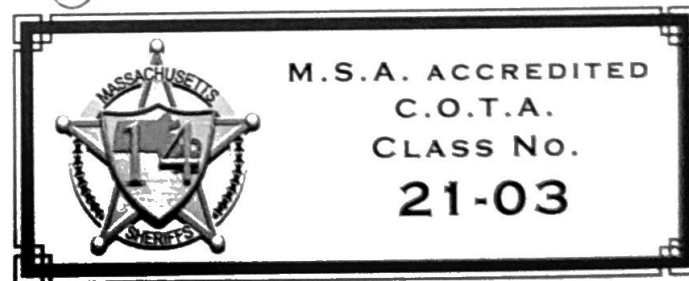

Repeating a Course

Students may repeat courses in which they earn a grade of D, F, W, WA, or NA. Students can petition the Registrar's Office to repeat a course when they have obtained a C grade or better but should recognize that they do so at a substantial risk. This process may be used no more than three times for courses with a letter grade of C or better. Repeating a course when the earlier attempt is a C or better is allowed only if the higher course grade is a course prerequisite or program requirement to continue in or enter a specific academic program. The grade in the final attempt automatically becomes the official grade for purposes of calculating grade point average and for determining eligibility for graduation. The grades for each attempt, however, are recorded and always remain on the student's transcript. Repeating a course may not be allowed in specific programs with outside accreditation.

Graduation with Honors

As of September 2005, Graduation with Honors is awarded to students who have completed all graduation requirements for an associate degree and have achieved a Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.30 to 3.49, less developmental credits; High Honors is awarded for GPA of 3.50-3.89, less developmental credits; and Highest Honors is awarded for GPA of 3.90 or above, less developmental credits.

From September 1973-August 2005, Graduation with Honors was awarded to students who have completed all graduation requirements for an associate degree and have achieved a Grade Point Average (GPA) of 3.50-3.74, less developmental credits; High Honors was awarded for GPA of 3.75-3.99, less developmental credits; and Highest Honors was awarded for GPA of 4.0, less developmental credits.

MassTransfer Program/Block

Students who choose to transfer before graduating, but who have completed the MassTransfer Block will satisfy the core/distribution/general education requirements at any public institution of higher education in Massachusetts.
