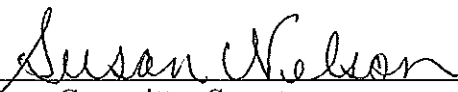

Roger Gorres, Self: The changes recommended improves the administration of this law will help eliminate unemployment abuse.; Carol Stines, Self: We need an unemployment policy that is reasonable and doesn't encourage unemployment; Elizabeth Putnam-Hidalgo, Self: This bill throws a wrench into people collecting unemployment--as if their lives are not difficult enough already!; Pat VanMaanen, Self: The punitive bill leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties. Let's help those who are unemployed not assume punish or assume ill will.; Denise Link, PhD, WHNP, Self: Busy work and an attempt to shame and humiliate people who are trying to find meaningful work that pays a wage that will support them and a family and benefits to protect their health and standard of living; Martha Clark-Benoit, Self: Strongly opposed; Mary Ann Graffagnino, Self: This is more work and time that takes away from time better spent by unemployed to look further for jobs.; Beatriz Urrea, Self: This is harsh and unfair. Who gets to decide what is a "suitable" job offer?; Lisa Olson, Self: Imposing automatic criminal penalties for people's lack of proving their job searching actions is a ludicrous idea, for many reasons. We are among the least benevolent states in the country, when it comes to addressing needs of the poor.; Christina Mollica, Self: I am a registered voter in LD29.; Dianne Post, Self, STATE CONFERENCE NAACP: You only make benefits harder to get and take longer to do harming the most vulnerable.; Carol Maas, Self: I guess this bill assumes people want to be unemployed since it is so lucrative in AZ. Or that these requirements are like a job - getting the interview, proving it and reporting it. For all this effort, they should get paid! Where's job trainin?; Kathleen Pettycrew, Self: this is too punitive; Barbara Oliver, Self: AUTOMATIC CRIMINAL PENALTIES ARE NOT THE WAY TO SOLVE THE JOB-LESS PROBLEM.; Susan Morris, Self: From what I understand, administering unemployment benefits is already time-consuming (and my guess is that it is underfunded, like much else in AZ). Expecting unemployed folks to justify their existence to receive paltry payments is stupid.; Erin Edwards, Self: Arizona's unemployment is a joke. It's way too low, and now you want to make it even harder for people to get some help??!!; Louise Good, Self: This bill has no provision for correcting misinformation.; Beverlee Loat, Self: lets not add more red tape for those seeking employment. Please oppose. Thank you!; Lawrence Peters, Self: Puts an undue burden on the potential employer to report the applicant. What defines a "suitable" job offer. Bill does not allow individual to correct any misinformation.; Linda Edwards, Self: Too cumbersome; Penny Boone, Self: This is a punitive right-wing extremist bill that solves no Az problem. It leaves no room for correcting misinformation, but instead carries automatic criminal penalties. Solve Az problems: fund public schools, water, housing. I oppose.; Anne Leota Hart, Self: We should not be penalizing those who have lost jobs. We should be helping people. And this bill would carrying automatic criminal penalties.; Virginia Dotson, Self: This bill is unnecessarily punitive.; Kathleen Dubbs, Self: Let's all punish people who can't find a job! Really?; Sue Thorne, Self: too punative a law. Needs to allow correction for misinformation and ghost njob offers. NO!; Mary-Jeanne Fincher, Self: AZ unemployment benefits are paltry, and yet this bill is trying to make them even harder to obtain. Please don't do this.; Norman Fuchs, Self: Unemployment is already hard enough without punitive bills like this one.; Kathleen Collins, Self: I am a registered AZ voter; Rebecca Haynes, Self: Excessive and punitive to people who are already hurting. And what constitutes a "suitable" job offer?; Mary Nelson, Self: Would make people who lost their jobs into criminals, not helpful when they are already struggling to find work; John Neville, Self: I would only hope that whoever supports this bill loses their job very soon and is refused unemployment funds. We need to help people who lose their jobs, not hurt them.; Jessica Kitterman, Self: The punitive bill leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties. At a weekly maximum of just \$320, Arizona ranks in the bottom 5 nationally for unemployment benefits.; Crystal Bazarnic, Self: Obviously written by

someone who has never struggled with unemployment. Adds unnecessary pressure AND puts a burden on potential employers. Vote no.; Melinda Iyer, Self: This is punitive and leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties.; Nancy Branham, Self: . This bill leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties. At a weekly maximum of just \$320, Arizona ranks in the bottom 5 nationally for unemployment benefits. Raise benefits THEN add additional actions; Candice Fremouw, Self: there are already reporting requirements No one wants to survive on unemployment benefits; Margaret Owen, Self: Awful. This is excessively punitive towards those who are already in a tough spot. If someone fails to show for an interview, they are automatically reported to DES with criminal penalties?? What if there's an emergency or if they're in an accident?; Dee Maitland, Self: Another Republican cruelty kicking people when they are down.; Roy Verdery, Self: Unemployed people have enough strikes against them that they don't need another punitive law.; Carol Garnett, Self: More burden on employers and the unemployed.; Sandra Adler, Self: Don't punish people who already have problems; Cynthia Wagner, Self: The punitive bill leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties. At a weekly maximum of just \$320, Arizona ranks in the bottom 5 nationally for unemployment benefits.; Carol Waymire, Self: Frighteningly punitive.; Nelson Morgan, Self: A punitive bill against people who have lost their job, carrying automatic criminal penalties without a clear way to correct misinformation.; Catherine Hopkins, Self: AT \$320 a week, people are looking for appropriate work for their credentials. They are not living the high life on \$320/week. Plus they are looking for work. This is a bill with no problem to solve. Just harass those already stressed; Shelly Gordon-Gray, Self: The bill leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties. At a weekly maximum of just \$320, Arizona ranks in the bottom 5 nationally for unemployment benefits. Currently people must lose their job.; Karolyn Switzer, Self: Getting unemployment benefits in Arizona is already quite restricted (and at a low maximum rate). We don't need to further restrict it, especially with no way to correct mistakes in reporting.; Margaret Tinsley, Self: Don't make it harder for unemployed Arizonans to survive. Vote no on this; Noah Richman, Self: Unnecessarily punitive, doesn't leave enough room to correct mistakes; Marilyn Murov, Self: 2108 is cruel and repressive. Individuals know what jobs suit them, not DES. No one should be forced to take a job that doesn't fit them and then be denied unemployment if they leave and look for other work. 5 work searches/week is unreasonable.; Marcia Tingley, Self: A punitive bill with no room for correcting misinformation.; RITA DEPUYDT, Self: This is an unnecessary, punitive measure that would only create tremendous extra work for government workers.; Aaron Essif, Self: This is just punitive. We already rank in the bottom 5 nationally for unemployment benefits. And remember, we all pay this insurance when we are working.; Joseph Myers, Self: Arizona likely needs to raise its unemployment benefits to a higher standard, when compared to other states in the western region.; Grant Tucker, Self: This just punishes those who are unemployed, when we should be trying to help them recover. This is positive punishment.; Rivko Knox, Self: AZ already ranks amongst the lowest states in unemployment benefits. A very punitive bill that includes criminal penalties for violations, with no opportunity to correct mistakes. NO!!!; Eric Kadel, Self: If there was a mechanism in place that would allow for correcting misinformation I would be in support of this bill.; Connie Cockrell, Self: No. Automatic punitive damages with no way to correct bad info?; Lois Hansen, Self: stop putting undue burden on people trying to find employment; Brandy Reese, Self: The punitive bill leaves no room for correcting misinformation, instead carrying automatic criminal penalties.; Cynthia Paster, Self: This is punitive.; Lisa Koenig, Self: This bill is overly punitive as written. Vote NO.; Jerry Wegenast, Self: There has to be a better way to reduce fraud. Perhaps fund the agency better.; Theresa Prichard, Self: This bill is unnecessarily punitive and leaves no room to correct reporting errors. The people who need this safety net pay a steep penalty that they can ill afford.; Sarah Bihms LD29, Self: Oppose HB2108 in Arizona, as it requires documentation of job search actions and punishes refusal of suitable job offers. Arizona pays low unemployment benefits and requires job loss for eligibility. Makes unemployment harder.; Jacob Raiford, Self: We attempt to penalize the unemployed by restricting assistance in the midst of rampant inflation and dwindling jobs, yet wonder why we're in a housing crisis. This bill is apathetic and cruel.; Steve Singkofer, Self: I'd suggest this entire bill be scrapped and replaced

with this: No Arizona legislator will bring a bill to the floor unless it contains five peer-reviewed, substantiated corroborative facts supporting said bill. Stop denigrating the poor. Vote no.

HB 2555: businesses; requirement to accept cash

Sponsor: Representative Chaplik, LD 3
Committee on Commerce

Overview

Stipulates that cash must be accepted as a form of payment by businesses located in this state.

History

Statute defines *legal tender* as a medium of exchange, including specie, that is authorized by the United States Constitution or Congress for payment of debts, public charges, taxes and dues (A.R.S. § 6-851).

Legal tender is federally defined as United States coins and currency (including Federal reserve notes and circulating notes of Federal reserve banks and national banks) are legal tender for all debts, public charges, taxes and dues. Foreign gold or silver coins are not legal tender for debts (Section 31, U.S.C. § 5103).

Provisions

1. Asserts businesses that are physically located in Arizona must accept cash as a form of payment for goods and services. (Sec. 2)
2. Prohibits businesses from charging a fee or penalty for using cash as a form of payment. (Sec. 2)
3. Stipulates a person has a cause of action against the person who commits a violation by denying the use of cash or charging a fee for using cash. (Sec. 2)
4. Specifies a person who has committed a violation is liable for damages for each violation amounting to \$1,000 with a maximum of \$1,000 per person per day or \$5,000 per person in total. (Sec. 2)
5. Entitles the prevailing plaintiff in an action to recover reasonable attorney fees and costs. (Sec. 2)
6. Directs the court to annually adjust the liability damage amounts for inflation. (Sec. 2)
7. Excludes online sales from the requirement to accept cash. (Sec. 2)
8. Makes a technical change. (Sec. 1)

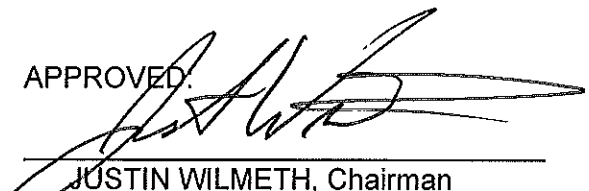

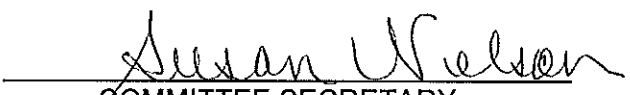

HB 2066: banks; financial institutions; personal information

Sponsor: Representative Carter, LD 15

Committee on Commerce

Overview

Requires banks and financial institutions to destroy a former customer's personal information.

History

All banks must keep their corporate and business records in accordance with the Deputy Director of the Department of Insurance and Financial Institutions' (DIFI) regulations. These regulations include: 1) the classification of records; 2) the establishment of allowable methods for effective and economical conservation of information contained in such records if the originals were destroyed in accordance with regulation; and 3) the prescribing of the minimal period of time for preservation of each record or a permitted substitute.

Additionally, the Deputy Director must be considerate of the following: 1) administrative and law proceeding actions that might require or desire the production of bank records; 2) limiting statutes applicable to an action or proceeding; 3) information availability from other sources that are held in bank records; and 4) matters that the Deputy Director considers important with the requirement of retaining records in a short period of time, such that those matters are correspondent with the interest of the bank customers, shareholders and people of the state in bank record availability. Banks may also discard of any record or permitted substitute that has been kept and is not under any requirement to produce such record in an action or proceeding (A.R.S. § 6-242).

Credit unions must maintain their books, accounts and records that will allow the Deputy Director to determine statutory compliance and the financial condition of the credit union. A credit union's books and records must be preserved at the address of the credit union that is filed with DIFI. The full accessibility to all books, papers, securities, records and other sources of information under the control of a credit union's officers, directors, employees or agents must be given to the Deputy Director as well (A.R.S. § 6-503).

Provisions

1. Directs banks and financial institutions to destroy all personal information that belonged to a former customer or client within three years of ending the business relationship. (Sec. 1)

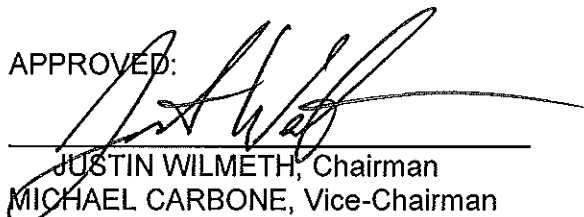

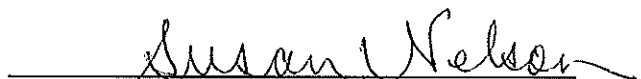

HB 2065: home insurers; discrimination; prohibition

Sponsor: Representative Carter, LD 15

Committee on Commerce

Overview

Excludes *age* as a factor used to calculate an insurance score.

History

An *insurance score* is a designation that is derived by using a variety of data sources, including an individual's consumer report in an algorithm, computer program, model or other process that reduces the data to a number, alpha character or rating that is used for insurance underwriting and rating decisions (A.R.S. § 20-2101).

When calculating an insurance score to determine property or casual premiums for insurance transactions, insurers are prohibited from using the following types of credit history: 1) the absence of a credit history; 2) credit histories or insurance scores based on collection accounts identified with a medical industry code; 3) a bankruptcy or lien that exceeds seven years; 4) the consumer's use of a specific credit card or debit card; 5) the consumer's cumulative available line of credit with the exception of outstanding debt; 6) an insurance score that is calculated using income, gender, address, zip code, ethnic group, religion, marital status or nationality of the consumer. However, an insurer is permitted to use the consumer's zip code, address, gender and marital status for underwriting purposes (A.R.S. § 20-2110).

Insurers use insurance scores primarily in underwriting and rating of consumers. Underwriting is the process by which the insurer determines whether a consumer is eligible for coverage and rating is the process that determines how much premium to charge a consumer (NAIC).

Provisions

1. Prohibits an insurer from calculating an insurance score or using an insurance score calculated by a third-party if such score used *age* as a factor. (Sec. 1)
2. Permits an insurer to use *age* for underwriting purposes. (Sec. 1)

Summary of the Strike-Everything Amendment to HB 2228

Overview

Clarifies a *home solicitation sale* as a sale that is made *without prior invitation, appointment or consent*.

History

A *home solicitation sale*: 1) is a sale of goods or services in which the seller or the seller's representative personally solicits the sale and the buyer's agreement or offer to purchase is made at a home other than that of the person soliciting the same and that agreement or offer to purchase is there given to the seller or the seller's representative; 2) includes a cash sale that otherwise meets the definition of a home solicitation sale if the seller makes or provides a loan to the buyer or obtains or assists in obtaining a loan for the buyer to pay the purchase price; and 3) does not include a sale that is pursuant to a preexisting account with a seller whose primary business is selling goods or services at a fixed location or made pursuant to prior negotiations between the parties at a business establishment where good or services are offered or exhibited for sale (A.R.S. § 44-5001).

The buyer has until midnight of the third business day to cancel the home solicitation sale. The buyer must provide a written notice of cancellation to the seller (A.R.S. § 44-5002).

Provisions

1. Modifies *home solicitation sale* to mean a sale that the seller personally solicits *without prior invitation, appointment or consent*. (Sec. 1)

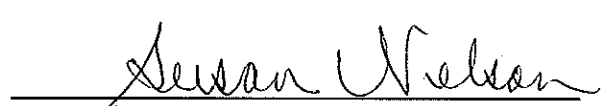

HB 2255: funeral practices; transportation protection agreements

Sponsor: Representative Wilmeth, LD 2

Committee on Commerce

Overview

Asserts that a *transportation protection agreement* is not insurance.

History

A funeral establishment may offer a prearranged funeral agreement which is an agreement for funeral good and services that are purchased before the death of the intended beneficiary and are delivered or performed after the beneficiary's death. The funeral goods and services are any personal property or services that are typically sold or provided in connection with the final disposition of human remains, such as caskets, outer burial containers, transportation containers, embalming services or funeral directing services (A.R.S. § 32-1301).

Provisions

1. Specifies a transportation protection agreement is not insurance in relation to funeral industry and travel insurance regulations. (Sec. 3)
2. Defines *transportation protection agreement* as an agreement that primarily provides or arranges for services that are related to preparing human remains or cremated remains for the purpose of transportation. (Sec. 1, 2)
3. Excludes services provided in accordance with a transportation protection agreement from being considered as *funeral goods and services*. (Sec. 1, 2)
4. Makes technical changes. (Sec 1, 2)

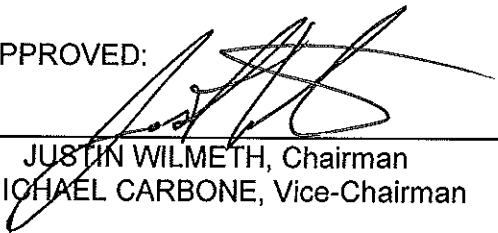
