Judgment in a Criminal Case for Reinstatement of Supervised Release

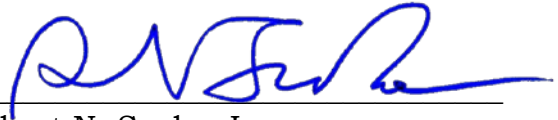
On March 24, 2025, this matter came before the Court for a Final Supervised Release Violation Hearing. The defendant, under oath, freely and voluntarily pleaded guilty to violations 2 and 3 in the “Petition for Offender Under Supervision,” filed February 26, 2025 (ECF No. 41 – restricted document). Based on the Defendant’s admission, the Court finds the Defendant has violated the terms and conditions of supervised release. Accordingly, it is hereby

Ordered and Adjudged that the Defendant's term of supervised release is hereby **reinstated** and modified as follows:

- 1) Defendant shall participate in the Location Monitoring Program.
- 2) Defendant is placed on house arrest (home detention) for a period of **three months** except for pre-approved activities and scheduled absences for employment, education, religious activities, medical treatment, attorney visits, court appearances, court-ordered obligations, and other allowances/activities as approved by the supervising officer.
- 3) Defendant is placed on monitoring technology for a period of **three months** at the discretion of the supervising officer.
- 4) Defendant shall have no contact with Chanquavia Aquamina.
- 5) Defendant shall maintain verifiable employment.
- 6) Defendant shall comply with all other conditions of supervised release previously imposed and set forth in the criminal judgment (ECF No. 36).
- 7) Violations 1 and 4 are dismissed on motion of the United States.
- 8) Defendant shall be released from the custody of the U.S. Marshals Service forthwith as it relates to this case.
